COURSES

Subjects that can be studied as part of your degree

ELECTIVE

Courses which you can choose that are not compulsory but can count towards your degree

MAJOR

Area of study/discipline area chosen as part of a degree

Eg. Bachelor of Commerce majoring in Marketing

LECTURE (LEC)

Prepared presentation used to deliver a course's content (remember to take notes!)

LABORATORY (LAB)

Classes where you apply course content in practice

TUTORIAL

Classes discussing course content.
Often you will be required to prepare homework

CENSUS DATE

Date by which your course enrolment, course payments, requests for Commonwealth assistance (HELP) are finalised. If you want to drop or change courses make sure you do beforehand!

HECS-HELP ASSISTANCE

Helps eligible Commonwealth supported students pay their university fees

UNITS OF CREDIT

A numerical value assigned to degree/course representing duration and workload

Eg. Bachelor of Commerce requires 128 UOC

Note: Each course is 6 UOC You can take a maximum of 18 UOC per term (3 courses)

WEIGHTED AVERAGE MARK (WAM)

Think of it as your grade/results for your degree



ocation: University Terraces

Aromatic and spiced, Yallah Eat is your gateway into the flavourful world of Middle Eastern cuisine. With a variety of pitas, salad bowls and rice bowls, this is guaranteed to pack a punch. We love the generous portion sizes and inclusivity of options.

other options: Vegetarian, Vegan, Halal personal favourite: Mini ricebowl with vegan potatoes for \$9



ocation: 2nd level Quad Food Court

Looking for the best value meal on campus? Look no further than the incredibly popular Q Lounge and Deli, where its likely you'll see students queuing for its main and side combo. ocation: Roundhouse

MARIONETTE

ocation: Above Matthews Food-court

For those coffee connoisseurs, Little Marionette's coffee is guaranteed to be stellar in quality and taste.

ocation: Outside Main Library

In the morning, there's always a line for this coffee cart. Would recommend if you're in a rush to head to class in upper campus- the colourful coffee cup is always a bonus.

PROS

- + Very quiet and private, ideal for silent study
- + Plenty of charging points



CONS

PROS

- + Plenty of seating with 4 levels
- + Plenty of charging points
- + Centralised location, can access the Quad from inside

- + Microwaves and vending machines

- Can get very crowded in the afternoon

PROS

PROS

- + Over 6 levels of seating with levels dedicated to silent study
- + Plenty of charging points
- + Napping pods
- + Lots of different seating arrangements: tables, lounges, stools
- + Can book study group rooms
- + Microwaves and vending machines

CONS

- Can get very crowded in the afternoon
- Often very noisy in peak times excluding the silent levels




What is your favouritte thing about UNI?

What would be the most important piece of advice you would give to first years?


My advice would be don't stress too much. If u see an opportunity, take it; regardless if you are ready or not.




Benefits of studying Marketing
