





Make sure to keep up to date with weekly course announcements and any necessary preparations. When in doubt, don't be shy to post a question on the forum!






CrossAngles

CrossAngles is a website that serves as an unofficial timetable planner for UNSW that many students use to plan their class schedules ahead of enrolment. 




What many consider the best coffee you can get at UNSW, with pink cups asthetic enough for your feed, don't miss this partially hidden haven by the bookshop!



Pros:


- + 6 levels of seating with silent study sections

Don't be afraid to give everything a go! Yes, it can be intimidating, but starting uni also signals a fresh start and new journey. Explore by attending events to meet new people and network!




1. What is your favourite thing about uni?


